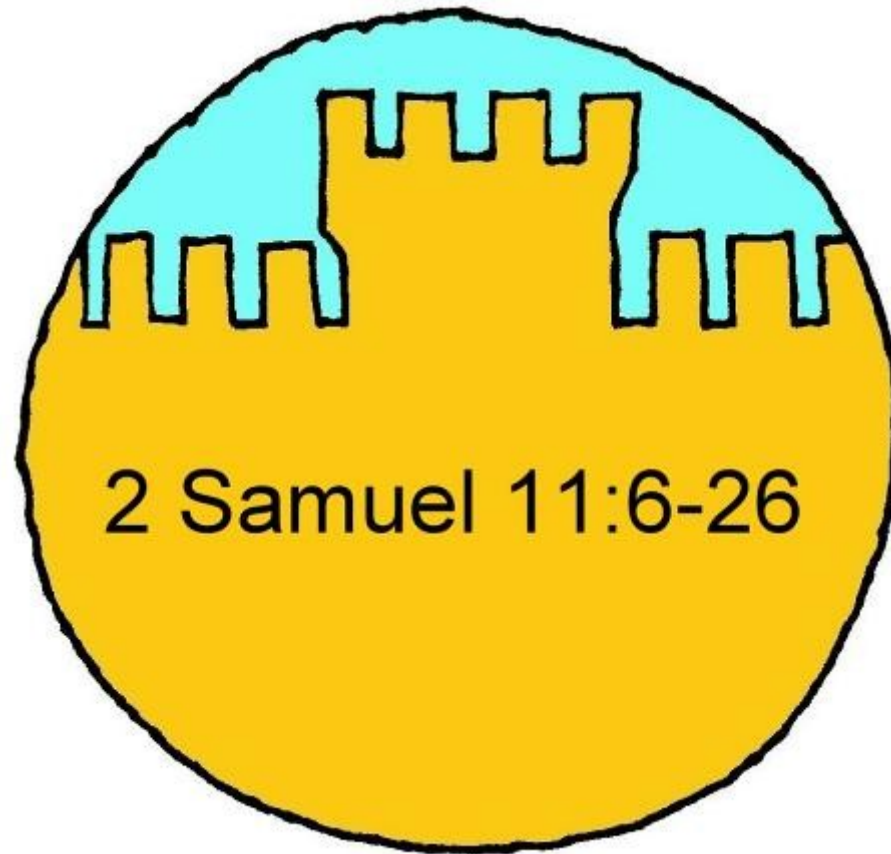
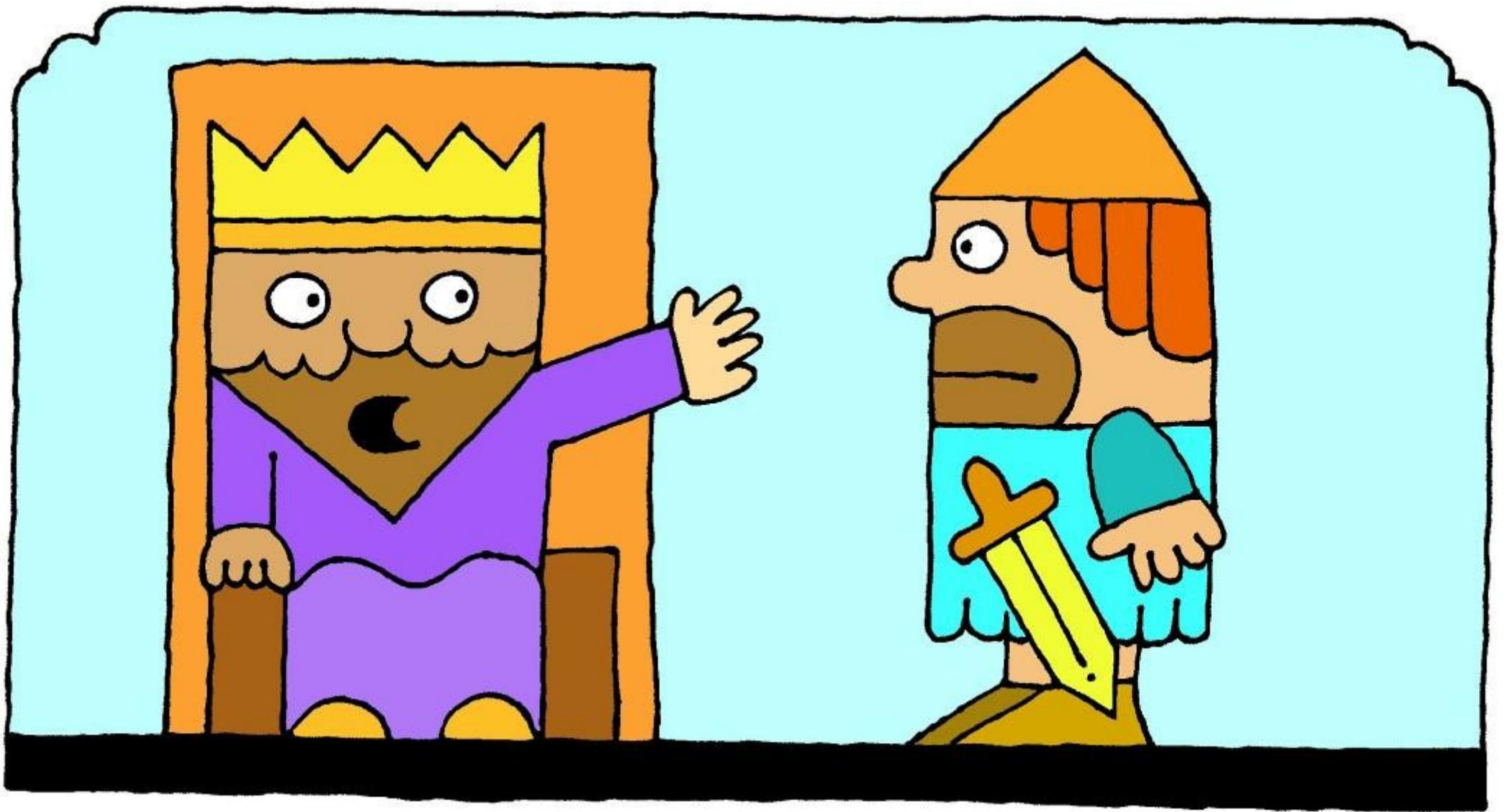


David And Uriah The Hittite

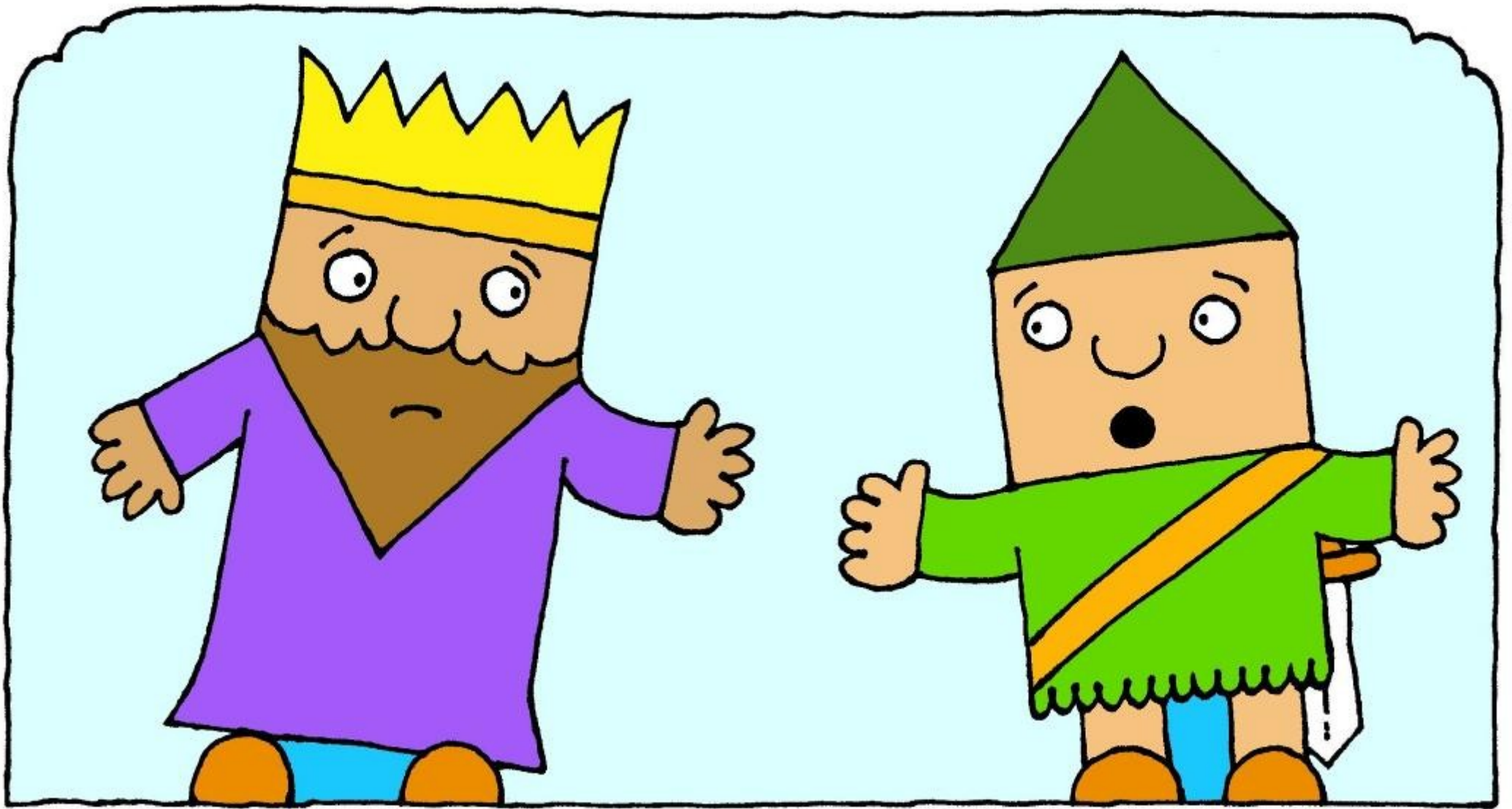

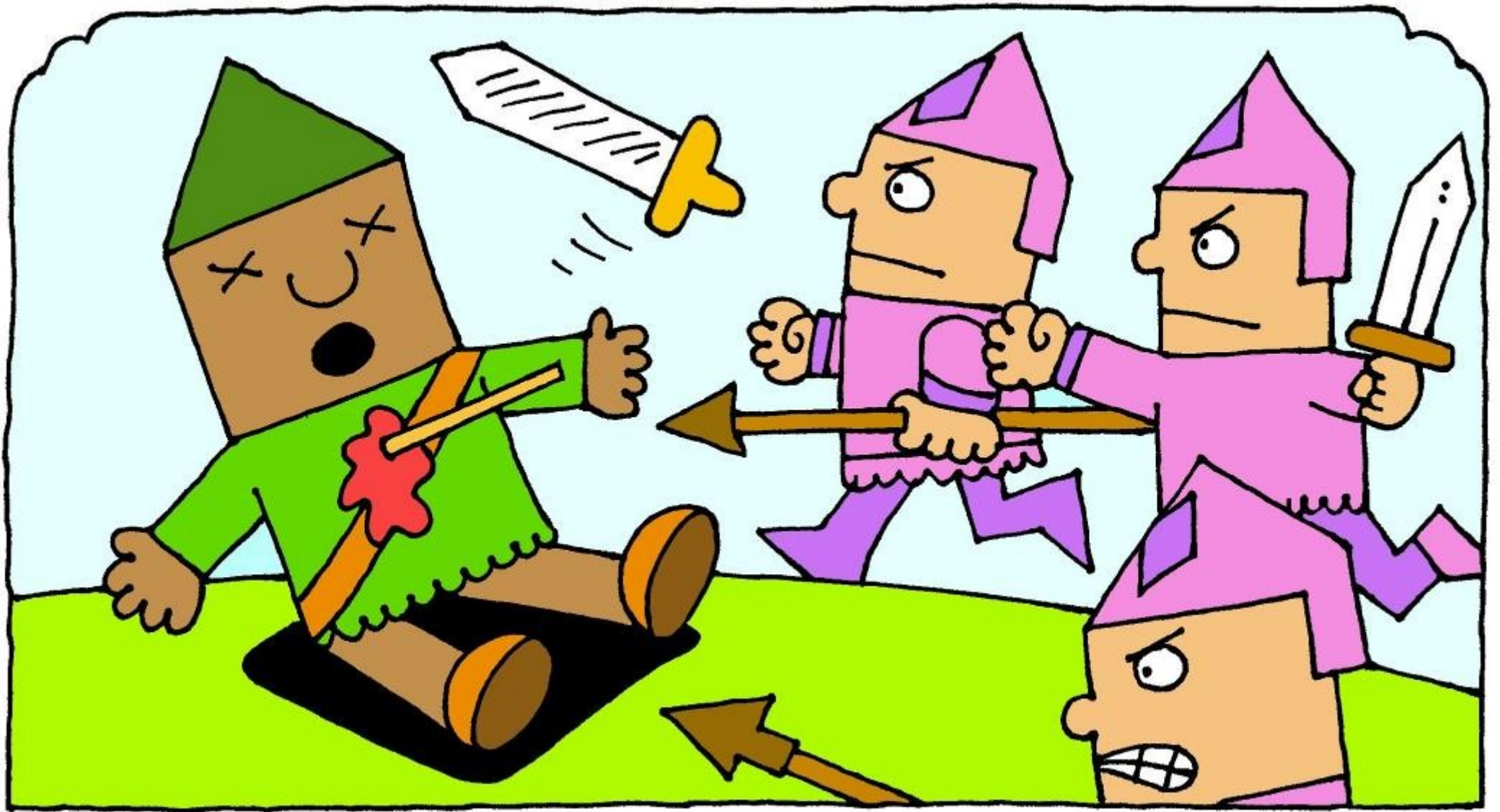
After asking Uriah about the war, King David said slyly, “Before you go back to fight, take a few days off and relax at home with your wife.”



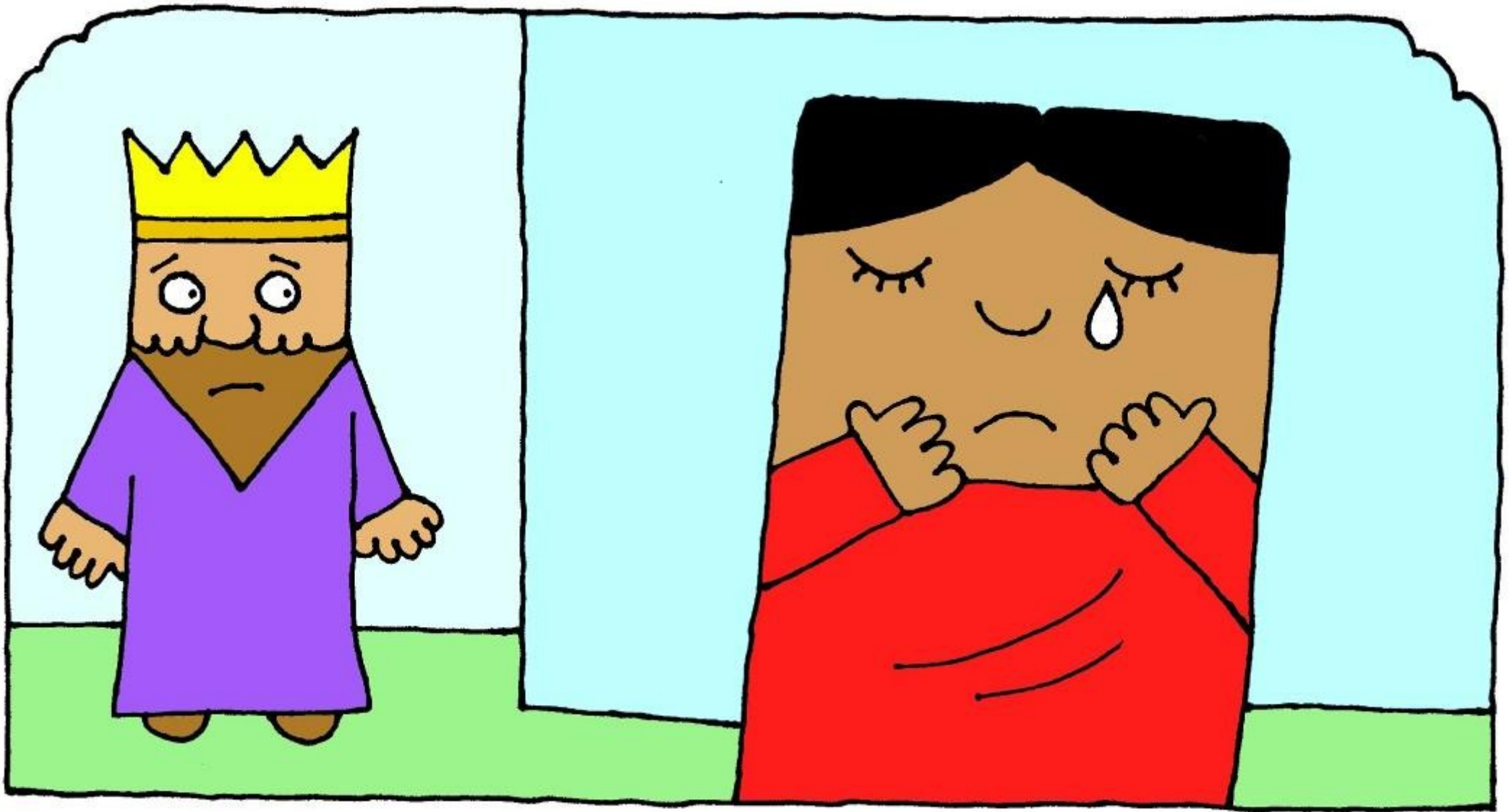
But, Uriah slept outside King David's door.
